GUIDELINES FOR CONTRIBUTORS OF LECTURES AND PAPERS IN HUNGARIAN STUDIES/MAGYARSÁGTUDOMÁNYI FÜZETEK.

Please prepare your manuscript according to the following specifications.

Type: clear computer-printed copy. No handwritten corrections or insertions are acceptable.

Heading: N O N E, since an inside title page will be produced. Start your paper at the top of the first page.

Layout: single spaced lines; margins 4 cm. (1½“) on left and right, 3 cm.(1”)on top and bottom. Make it “right justified“, i.e., right margin aligned.

Pagination: do not use any, or in pencil only.

Size: minimum 16 pages. Do not inflate the manuscript by using double space or unnecessarily spacious layout.
